 - The department is involved in carrying out ethnographic research work among different communities in Rajasthan. The research activities have resulted in addressing many social issues at national and international platform. The contribution in the field of research is well evident by the publications of the faculty and the doctoral work of the research scholars.
 - Students from different streams take admission in anthropology. After completing PG Course of two years they pursue their career in different fields such as fashion and designing industry, police, vigilance, defence, bank, administrative services etc. There they work with keeping people's perspective and cultural values in mind, the key to success.
 - The department is able to enhance tolerance and acceptability for other cultures and religions among youth population by imparting anthropological knowledge by means of syllabi tour, lectures and seminars.

Following are major Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Challenges of the department:

Strength:

- The Department contributes in capacity building of students with the help of tradition of field work to conduct micro- level holistic studies as part of core knowledge.
- Recently department has Introduced two new papers of current importance so as to help the students in Administrative jobs and Development sector. They are :

- Anthropology of Rajasthan
- Applied Anthropology
- Projects from U.G.C., ICSSR

Weakness:

- Present faculty is specialized in Social Anthropology only. Department is not able to provide specialization in another equally important branch i.e. Physical Anthropology. Therefore, specialized faculty in Physical Anthropology is immediately required.
- Lack of infrastructure such as proper Lab of Physical Anthropology and Archaeological Museum. Efforts will be made to develop the lab and establish Anthropological Museum in the department.
- The subject is lesser known in general public.
- Lack of Class rooms.

Opportunities:

• The students have better job opportunities in Development sector in comparison to other subjects of Social Sciences.

Challenges:

- To make students aware of the subject.
- Anthropology is not recognized as a discipline in the state departments/institutions. Govt. Job vacancies generally do not include Anthropology subject as one of the eligibility criterion.
- Tough competition to find job in other states also due to lack of comprehensive knowledge of Physical Anthropology which may be addressed by filling up the post of Professor. G.B. Pant Chair.
- Insufficient infrastructure facilities.

52. Future plans of the department

The department proposes to start the following in the forthcoming times

- There is need of establishing a formal counselling cell in the department and the colleges to motivate the students of different streams to opt the subject for P.G. and U.G. Course. At present the counselling in colleges is being done in a general way not i.e. the counselling is not Anthropology-focused. Informal counselling of the students who wish to apply for Anthropology as a subject in P.G. is done by the teachers of the department. The same may be extended up to School level for the students of 12th class by creating interaction platforms in the schools and aware them on relevance of Anthropology in contemporary time.
- The department of Anthropology in the university is the only Anthropology department in Rajasthan. We plan to set- up a "Centre for Cultural Studies" in the department to provide a platform for the researchers (National and International) working in the field of cultural studies and to establish academic links through exchange programmes with other universities to work cross-culturally as well.
