

SCHEME OF EXAMINATION

B.A. (Honours) Examination

(10+2+3 Pattern)

R-II (I)

For a pass at each examination a candidate should be required to obtain a minimum of 36% marks in each subsidiary subject and 40% marks in the Honours subjects, passing separately in the practicals, wherever prescribed.

Successful candidates will be classified as under :

First Division	60%	} of the aggregate marks prescribed in Honours and subsidiary subjects of Part I, Part II & Part III Examinations taken.
Second Division	50%	

All the rest shall be declared to have passed the examination
No division shall be awarded at the Honours Pt. I and Pt. II
examination.
